Kansas Beta Strives to Build on Success -

Kansas Beta has had a stellar year. After being recognized as one of the top fraternities at Kansas State and by Σ AE National in 2022, we are not resting on our laurels. Kansas Beta strives to be the best chapter in academics, intramurals and athletics, while also having fun.

We initiated 33 members last fall, and they show great leadership promise. We initiated two new members in the spring and received a transfer from our brothers at UMKC.

The chapter house is again full this academic year with 61 brothers living at 1015 Denison and a total of just over 100 members. Recruitment for the 2023-24 academic year is off to a strong start. The recruitment team has met with more than 50 potential members.

AWARDS

Kansas Beta received a Dean's Award for achieving 80% of points toward our chapter goals this past year. The award was announced at the K-State Fraternal Excellence Awards on Feb. 19. We have also set ambitious goals for the coming year.

- Win Top Fraternity in the Nation with the North American Interfraternity Council and ΣΑΕ National.
- Finish in the top three K-State fraternity chapters in grades for the spring 2023 semester.
- Finish with the highest philanthropic contribution among all fraternities on campus.

ACADEMICS

Success in the classroom remains a priority for Kansas Beta. For the Fall semester, the combined effort of brothers delivered a 3.36 GPA for the chapter, which earned a Gold award for K-State fraternities with a 3.3 GPA or higher. Members worked hard adjusting to in-person classes following the COVID pandemic. Their efforts resulted in 27 members achieving a 3.5 or higher GPA and 19 members achieving a 4.0.

INTRAMURALS

Kansas Beta has had a very successful year so far in intramurals. Our football team won the fall championships and brought home the championship trophy. The soccer team finished just short of a repeat with a third-place finish. We're very confident in our basketball and softball teams. Kansas Beta is on a mission to become intramural champions of the 2022-23 school year.

We also participated in the Walk to End Alzheimer's and raised over \$3,000 for the Alzheimer's Association.

NEW CHAPTER OFFICERS ATTEND NATIONAL LEADERSHIP TRAINING

New Kansas Beta Chapter officers hit the ground running after seven of the leadership team, along with Housing Corporation President Steve Lacy, attended the Σ AE National Executives Academy in Atlanta the weekend of January 6 to 8.

ΣAE student leaders from dozens of chapters across the country participated in sessions focused on topics such as problem-solving, chapter goals, self-development and community service.

Each officer took a specific track aligned to his responsibility. For example, the treasurer track focused on creating and managing a budget.

The Kansas Beta officers came to the Executives Academy prepared. Eminent Archon Adam Wheeler said the officers had already set their goals for the year

Wheeler said he particularly liked a session about getting brothers who live outside the house involved in chapter activities.

While it was customary back in the day for actives to live in the house for all of their college years, most actives now live at most three years and many two or even one year in the house. Keeping them involved is vital.

"One of the complaints we get is that brothers outside the house don't know about all the activities such as guest speakers. As a result of the Executives Academy, I implemented an app called Flare that allows us to communicate better with them about all our activities," Wheeler said.

Young Alumnus Chase Stalder Is a Shining Example

In October 2021, Chase Stalder '19 made a fateful suggestion to Housing Corporation President Steve Lacy '76 that Kansas Beta should try to have an alumni golf outing and tailgate event over a K-State football weekend.

Lacy liked the idea and asked Stalder to research it. Thus began a journey that led to Stalder to organizing the hugely successful event at the Manhattan Country Club from 1,300 miles away in Jacksonville, Florida.

Florida is where the Abilene native moved to work as a customer executive for Hormel Foods after graduating from K-State with degrees in marketing and sales. During his three years living in the house, Stalder served in several leadership roles including Vice President and Recruitment Chairman twice.

At first it was daunting to plan and organize the golf outing from afar, Stalder said. How to pick a golf course when you can't go see it? Which weekend was best for maximum turnout? He tapped into his network of brothers and alumni leadership to answer those questions.

Most important of all was getting ΣAE brothers committed to attending.

"The goal of this event was creating a weekend that allowed alumni to reconnect, so I tried to personally reach out to as many alumni as possible. We also received help from alumni who were willing to extend the invite through their personal networks, which was very helpful," Stalder said.

The outcome was a great weekend. The weather cooperated and more than 60 alumni participated. The event was so successful that the date has been set for 2023 and Stalder said his goal this year is 72 golfers, which would allow four players to start on each of the 18 holes.

HOUSING UPDATES

The House Corporation recently finished upgrading all five chapter house restrooms and replacing the glass block windows in the formal living room. The total cost of these projects was approximately \$200,000, and they were completed in two phases during the summers of 2021 and 2022.

Planned summer 2023 projects include renovating the second- and third-floor hallways, which includes painting, upgrading the fire alarm system, and replacing the ceiling and floor coverings. Total cost is expected to be about \$50,000. To date, about \$25,000 has been raised.
